# SWEEPING CHANGES IN RACECOURSE SECURITY

## New Measures in Force by 1966?

THE sweeping changes in the security of racecourses outlined in a 19-page report by the "F.W.P." committee released today (see Page 17) have been accepted in principle by the Jockey Club.

It is not expected, however, that the recommendations will be put into practice before 1966. This date was forecast by Major General Sir Randle Feilden, who, with Lord Willoughby De Broke and Mr. Jim Phillips, formed the Committee, when he spoke at a press conference held at Newmarket this morning.

Sir Randle stated that the only exceptions made by the Jockey Club in their acceptance of the report were two items regarding transit of racehorses between

training stables and racecourses. They read "drivers should be in possession of an identity card" and "horse box firms should be registered."

The Jockey Club wish to give further consideration to these points because of the big problems—particularly with National Hunt racing.

The National Hunt Committee will not debate the report until their meeting in May. There is now to be an Inspector of Security, and the post has gone to Brig. Henry Green—a one-time racecourse commentator, who is shortly to leave the Army.

### Stables Security

Referring to security at training stables, Maj-Gen. Sir Randle Feilden commented that it was impossible to make one's home completely secure against burglars, so how could a trainer do the same for a stable. "So instead we dealt with the problem of making the racecourse stables secure," he said.

He said that Securitor Ltd were prepared to take over stable security under the Clerk of the Course, and at a cost less than under the present system. The firm are already organised into regions over the country and would supply uniformed men on the stable gates, and even a guard on the stable lads canteen.

Sir Randle emphasised that some responsibility must be put back on trainers, but at present there was a lack of security in the type of man they employ.

### In Favour

Extra stables would have to be built on the racecourses, but the whole cost could not be estimated at present. Immediate reaction from trainers has been overwhelmingly in favour of the report.

Bill Elsey, who has stables at Malton in Yorkshire, said: "I have only looked at the report briefly but I think that the proposals are sound and in racing's interests."

Both Newmarket trainer Jack Jarvis and Epsom trainer Peter Ashworth said their immediate reactions were in favour. The latter said: "There are some splendid ideas in the report."

## Football Peace for the Time Being

THERE looks to be peace in professional football, at least for the time being, as the result of the meeting of club chairmen at St. Anne's today.

Mr. Alan Hardaker, the League Secretary, said: "There is no rule in the book now concerning a maximum wage and no question of one being introduced in the foreseeable future."

Mr. Cliff Lloyd, Secretary of the Professional Footballers' Association, when he heard of this, stated: "We welcome the news."

The only note of discord came when Mr. Hardaker said that it was "rather tactless" of Mr. Lloyd to talk of players never accepting a "reimposition of a maximum wage when there had been no question of any departure from what had been agreed with the union."

Clubs seemed to be in general agreement of an increased minimum price of admission to First and Second Division matches next season and they appeared to be thinking in terms of 3s 6d and 4s instead of the present 2s 6d and 3s.

Most of the meeting was taken up with the discussion on the "Pattern of Football" including the reorganisation of the League. Clubs were in agreement on principle and the League Management Committee will put forward a resolution for the annual meeting on June 8.

At the same time there was a feeling that big changes are unlikely yet and that it may take two or three years for a major alteration in the construction of the League.

## U's RETAINED LIST AXES THREE Devine, Flatt and Dunne to go

CAMBRIDGE UNITED F.C.'s retained list, released today, axes three senior players—wingers Willie Devine and Colin Flatt and inside-forward Jimmy Dunne. The remaining 12 seniors are retained.

The release of the two recognised wingers, Devine and Flatt, points to the fact that Roy Kirk's search for new players is centred around these positions. The other player to go was expected, for Jimmy Dunne, good ball player that he is, has never made the grade in Southern League football at Newmarket Road.

Many people think that the United manager was wrong in not releasing several other players, but Roy Kirk told a "Cambridge News" reporter that he was confident the players he had most of whom had youth on their side, were capable of playing good football.

"They can play extremely well as was shown at Dartford tonight. I think they can do better and with one or two others can be one of the best teams in the League next year," he added.

Now the manager intends to sign four more players to complete his squad and also introduce a trainer, who will be in close contact with his players.

## BUTLER HAS BEST CHANCE

THREE players were sharing the early lead in the first round of the Schweppes P.G.A. Close professional golf championship at Western Gailes, Ayrshire today, each with 70. They were the holder, Peter Butler (Harrow), George Will (Walton Heath) and Tony Fisher (Sudbury).

It was Will's 27th birthday, and out first, his 70 constituted a record for the lengthened course. But Butler, fresh from an American tour, had the best chance of taking an outright lead. He was three under four at the 15th, but dropped a stroke at the 16th.

## Prescott's Chance of Title Fight

If Johnny Prescott beats Joe Erskine convincingly in their 10 rounds fight at Birmingham on Tuesday, promoter Jack Solomon will offer him a British heavy weight title fight against Henry Cooper in London, possibly on his Eve-of-the-Derby promotion.

## Birmingham Doubts

Birmingham, struggling to avoid relegation, are doubtful about the fitness of their forwards Jimmy Harris and Ken Leek, for the away game with West Ham tomorrow night.

Both will have fitness tests early tomorrow.

## SMARTIE IS 100-6 WINNER

## INCENTIVE IS TOKYO TRIP

WITH women riders eligible for the first time in the Horse Trials team at this year's Olympic Games, to be held in Tokyo in October, Britain's top horsewomen were competing at the three-day Badminton horse trials, which started today in the grounds of the Duke of Beaufort's Badminton House (Gloucestershire), where the Queen Mother and the Princess Royal are staying for the event. Whether a rider is chosen for or not entirely, on his or her performance in the next three days. After the Badminton results have been studied, a short list of those invited to train for the Games will be announced.

Five women riders with considerable experience are competing at Badminton—Miss Susan Fleet, who won the one-day event last year, Miss Barbara Roger-Smith, Miss Althea Roger-Waddington, and Miss Shelagh Kesler. For the first time, a woman rider from a Continental country will compete at Badminton. She is Mlle. R. Cailleux, of France, riding Harmonieuse. Two American women riders will also compete. Of the British men riders, Michael Bullen is the only one with previous Olympic experience. Other riders include Captain
