

# The new U's complete a splendid treble

WITH a pulsating display of teamwork and fitness, Cambridge United completed a great treble of pre-season victories when they beat the full night of Second Division Plymouth Argyle at Newmarket Road on Saturday to add to previous triumphs over Coventry City and Colchester United.

## Cambridge United 2, Plymouth Argyle 1

centre-forward Frank Lord but Billy Kelly, the United skipper, kept a close watch and much of the visitors' punch was missing. The U's were obviously confident after their two previous victories and when other things tilted them there was always that to fall back on. Not that it was needed, for the well-disciplined pattern of play adopted by the U's always made them a threat.

Unlike the game against Colchester, the home wingers were never in command but they both still played intelligently when they found the visiting backs were hard men to pass.

### Main threat

One of the United's main threats came from the wing-halves, who attacked sensibly. They had planned their game and when one attacked the other defended. Scurr had two scorching shots that brought great saves from Maclaren. Plymouth's big goalkeeper, and Walsh started the move that resulted in United's first goal.

Brian Doyle, United's coach, read the game carefully from the side lines and must have found it gratifying to see his players following his commands so readily. Several times he spotted danger as the visitors' centre-half, Reg Wyatt, moved upfield but each time Gibson moved back to cut out the threat.

United are a new side, although composed in the main of last season's players. Injected with new blood, but with new ideas from Brian Doyle, there is a new enthusiasm.

This was the mixture that went together to make the team that completed the great pre-season treble and will without doubt go on to surprise many people in the Southern League even, it seems, some of their own supporters.

Plymouth were the first to attack as their forwards moved smoothly into action. United were fully extended in these opening minutes to hold the powerful visitors. But the home side played with plenty of spirit and were first to score in the 15th minute when Welsh sent Atkinson through. The inside-forward held the ball just long enough before passing on to

Gibson, who controlled it brilliantly before lobbing it over the advancing goalkeeper's head.

Slack twice saved splendidly as the visiting forwards surged forward looking for the equaliser, but United's attack still carried plenty of venom and Maclaren made two great saves, one from Gibson and the other from a Scurr piledriver.

### Two up

In the second half, instead of making the five usual changes, only Finch and McVittie came on in place of Jones and Haasz respectively.

Plymouth put on the pressure and play swung from end to end with Maclaren making two more great saves from Gibson before, in the 70th minute, he could only parry a fierce shot from the centre-forward and McVittie was on the spot to blast the ball home.

With 12 minutes to go, Plymouth got one back after a frightful mix-up in United's defence when Trebilcock crashed the ball home from a narrow angle, despite Finch's desperate effort to clear off the line.

# City too often robbed in possession at Kettering

Kettering 2, Cambridge City 1. (Attendance 1,235).

THIS second pre-season trial, played by City at Kettering on Saturday, was a very different affair from the smooth, open display seen by Milton Road supporters against Norwich the previous Tuesday.

Here was an occasion when City were robbed in possession by a side that never gave up and tackled hard. Kettering players seemed to be playing for prestige and their places in the club's First Division Southern League side, while City were content to amble through the game, taking it as a little harder than usual match practice.

As a result City never settled down nor showed their paces and for long spells in the second period their defence was hard pressed to keep the Poppies' forwards at bay.

### Fine header

It took Kettering eleven minutes to take the lead, through Norman Bleanch, leader of City's attack last season. Brian Caine, the keeper signed by Tommy Dawson from Barrow, did well to turn a hard shot from Kettering's inside right, Kerry, round the corner but right winger Salmon's flag kick found Bleanch in an unmarked position and the centre-forward headed home in fine style.

After some patchy play by both sides, the equaliser arrived for City in the 23rd minute through the efforts of the inside-right, Alan Spears, although the right-winger, Billy Wall actually fapped the ball home after a scramble in the goal-mouth.

For a while City got slightly on top, but their forwards failed to create any clear-cut opportunities as the home defence went all out to clear their lines. Kettering's new manager, centre-half White, was obviously determined to make his players work as hard as possible. He was signed from Doncaster in the close season after it was rum-

oured he might take Oscar Hold's managerial job in the Rovers' camp. One of the things he insisted upon was that Kettering should become a full-time professional side, and it looks as though the Northamptonshire club could come back into the Premier Division if they keep up this pace.

### Desperate

Certainly the home side had the majority of the play in the second period as City players in midfield had the ball taken from them. It was a pattern seen many times before—the ball being cleared, worked part of the way upfield, a

tackle and then back would come the opposing forwards to harry the defence once more.

On the hour mark things became really desperate as the ball flashed across the visitors' goal and Bleanch went very close just then. Soon afterwards Kerry put the ball inches over the top with a lovely hook shot.

Caine had lots of luck as the ball struck his legs and outstretched boots, but inevitably he was beaten not through any fault of his own.

Kerry scored with a great shot 15 minutes from the end when he was left alone in the middle after centre half Jack McGugan was drawn out to meet inside left Wild. The pass beat him and Kerry cracked the ball home from just outside the penalty area.

### 'Nothing at stake'

The game ended with City's forwards showing a little more life but they still could not penetrate.

"We're not worried about the result," Tommy Dawson said after wards. "They certainly did not treat this as a practice match and our fellows were not going out there to get hurt when there was nothing at stake."

# St. Neots give City Reserves a lesson

St. Neots Town 7, Cambridge City Reserves 0. HAVING beaten Bedford Reserves 3-1 in a mid-week game and dealing out a 7-0 thrashing to Cambridge City Reserves on Saturday, St. Neots Town start the season on Saturday with justified optimism.

For the full 90 minutes of Saturday's match, the St. Neots attack methodically and, at times, almost cruelly pulled the City reserve to ribbons. Meanwhile, the St. Neots rearguard smothered almost every attempt the visitors made in their efforts to score.

Ironically, it was two ex-City men, Willie Burgess and Francis Brand, who played lead parts in the destruction of their former club side. Burgess, who was playing on trial, started as left-winger, but in the second half moved to inside left to make up a deadly trio with Brand and Ray Sutton, the centre forward.

It was Burgess who set the trend in the first two minutes, when he was in position to snap up a header from Sutton and hit the ball hard into the roof of the net.

Right-half Mick Laing headed the second from a Burgess corner, and Sutton made it three just before half-time from a pass from Brand.

A pinpoint chip from Sutton in the 57th minute gave Burgess the chance to head St. Neots into a 4-0 lead.

The City defence were under heavy pressure, and it was almost inevitable that St. Neots should add more to their commanding tally of goals.

Brand leapt high in the 70th minute to head home the fifth, and ten minutes later slipped the ball to left-winger Dennis Jones,

who smashed it first time past City keeper Heath.

Just before full time, Sutton jiggled his way about in the City penalty area and eventually pushed the ball through to Brand for the inside-right to complete the scoring.

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## Boycott cracks 113 but England crawl

ENGLAND cleared their arrears of 197 just before lunch on the fourth day of the final Test at The Oval but found themselves tied down to defence afterwards by Australia's spinners, Simpson and Vivers.

The only wickets which fell by mid-afternoon were those of Boycott and Titmus, but not before Boycott had made a splendid 113—his maiden Test century. He batted just on five hours and his fine display gave England a slight chance of winning the match and sharing the series.

Fred Titmus, who went in as "night watchman" on Saturday, helped Boycott add 80 for the third wicket. Although he once drove Vivers for six, Titmus was extremely slow.

### Spin

The pitch took spin, but with rain about and only a day and a half to go, England had to take risks.

The first hour after lunch produced only 26 runs despite the fact that Simpson and Vivers bowled 24 overs. For a leg-spinner, Simpson sent down surprisingly few bad balls, but when he did drop one short, Titmus pulled it hard to the on-boundary.

That was the end of Simpson. He belatedly called for the new ball at 23, after 112 overs. Titmus welcomed this on a driving McKenzie for four off the first delivery, but had to take a painful blow under the heart in the same over. Titmus was bowled by McKenzie for 56.
