

Disappointing performance

WHAT an anti-climax Cambridge United's first Southern League game of the season turned out to be. After the fine form shown in the three public trial games the U's gave a dismal performance against Hastings United at Newmarket Road on Saturday.

For much of the game the United players promised so much but little was fulfilled and although they were dominant for most of the minutes they only scored one goal. Then they allowed a work-manlike Hastings side to make a late rally, score the equaliser and take a point away.

The whole of this side was disappointed. There was no plan and the players did not appear to think what they were doing. Gibson controlled a lonesome beat down the middle of the field and with a little luck in the first half hour in particular, he should have been able to have given his side a comfortable winning margin.

His only reward for his energies was the knowledge that he was mainly responsible for the U's goal which was scored by McVittie.

Missing was the fire that had put down three league clubs in seven days and also strangely absent was the U's great team spirit.

started with a bang and swarmed into the attack and three times Agate saved brilliantly while Gibson hit the post and in the first few minutes. After this, although they were in command, they became more and more ragged.

Chepstow to get a facelift

A £53,000 rebuilding scheme for Chepstow racecourse will start on September 1, it was announced today by the vice-chairman of the racecourse company, Colonel Roderick Hill. The entire cost is being contributed by the Horserace Betting Levy Board. The scheme includes major improvements to the members' stand, renovation of Tattersall's stand, pending rebuilding, and the merging of the silver ring with Tattersall's enclosure. Although admission charges to the new combined enclosure have not yet been decided, they will probably be between 15s and £1. Long term plans at Chepstow include the re-siting of the parade ring behind the stands where it will be more easily accessible to patrons in both Members and Tattersall's, transferring the Tote buildings to the stands, and an exit from the paddock to the racecourse which will give racegoers in the 5s enclosure a view of the horses. Sir Rupert Brazier-Creagh, secretary of the Levy Board, said that Chepstow was one of the first group of courses to receive a subsidy from the Horserace Betting Levy Board for rebuilding.
