

Our swimming girls off to a bad start

BRITAIN'S three girls were all eliminated in the women's 100 metres freestyle heats at the Olympic Swimming Pool in Tokio today.

The three, Sandra Keen (Heston) Diana Wilkinson (Stockport), and Linda Amos (Bristol) all returned times well below their best.

Australia's 27-year-old swim queen, Dawn Fraser, headed the qualifiers for the semi-finals with a time of 60.6 secs. She is bidding for a hat-trick of Olympic wins in this event.

Sandra Keen, 17-year-old Middlesex student, finished fifth in her heat. After being up with the leaders at the turn, she could not end the finishing speed of her rivals and clocked 64.7 secs.

Training set-back

Diana Wilkinson, 20-year-old Cheshire student, also trailed in fifth in her heat. Diana, a former European record holder, was short of training due to an infected left arm, which she carried in a sling during her first week in Tokio. She clocked 65.0 secs.

Linda Amos, 18, a clerk, had the slowest time of the three British girls, clocking 66.1 secs to finish sixth of eight in her heat.

Ingrid Engel-Kramer, 21-year-old blonde East German, today became a triple gold medalist by winning the springboard diving title.

Mrs. Engel-Kramer, a physical education student, won both the springboard and high diving titles in Rome four years ago. She is bidding for an Olympic double again in Tokio.

Runner-up for the springboard title was Jeanne Collier (U.S.A.) Patsy Willard, another American, won the bronze medal.

This was the second gold medal to be decided among the record 163 at stake.

The German girl dived superbly to total 145 points in her ten dives. Miss Collier totalled 138.55 to edge her American team-mate, Miss Willard (138.18) into third place. John Candler whose club, Highgate, collected £300 to pay for his return to Britain from America, where he is studying, was well down the field after two compulsory dives in the men's springboard event today.

Candler's first dive earned 10.88 points, and his second 12.07 points, and he finished the session in ninth place.

Clever McCluskey a worthy winner

JOHN McCLUSKEY, the British champion, won his opening bout in the flyweight class of the Olympic boxing tournament today.

McCluskey, 20-year-old Scot from Hamilton, scored a popular points victory over Veerapen Komolsen, a strong Thailand soupaw.

The judges split four to one in favour of McCluskey, who fought a clever battle making full use of his speed and experience.

McCluskey fought a shrewd fight, using every inch of the ring to counter his opponents strength. He kept moving in and out all the time at the start of the fight, scoring with left jabs and occasional rights.

He was more accurate with his punches than Komolsen, who, however, got in some solid straight lefts, especially when he caught McCluskey near the ropes.

In the second round both had difficulty in getting through each other's defence.

Heavy punches

Komolsen, sensing the fight slipping away, went after McCluskey at the start of the third round with a sustained two-fisted attack. The Scot took some heavy punches but also threw plenty himself.

He was particularly effective in bouncing off the ropes to get away from his opponent and landed several barrages of combination punches to make sure of the decision.

McCluskey, unmarked and eager for the next step in his search for a gold medal, said: "I hope I've set the ball rolling for the team. It was a tough fight. He was no mug."

Action

John McCafferty, the Irish soupaw, scored a clever points victory over the Cuban, Rafael Carbonell, in an action-packed flyweight bout.

The judges gave a unanimous decision after one of the best bouts seen so far before a 4,000 crowd.

The Cuban gave McCafferty a few uneasy moments with fierce two-fisted attacks in the first round, but the 19-year-old Irishman showed his superior skill in defence and countered cleverly with straight lefts and hooks.

Discus champion fit again

America's world and Olympic discus champion, Al Oerter, was reported fit to-day after being under observation for 48 hours because of straining his right side.

Recovered

The British wrestler, Albert Aspen, of Bolton, who twisted an ankle in his match with a Bulgarian opponent yesterday, was recovering to-day after intensive treatment.

Preparation

The Scottish-born boxer, John McCluskey, prepared for his first Olympic fight to-day by doing the washing up for his team-mates in the kitchen of their quarters in the Olympic village.

"We all take turns with the dishes here," McCluskey said.

A late goal robs Jockeys

NEWMARKET 2, GOTHIC 3 NEWMARKET must be wondering today how they lost in a game where they had nearly three-quarters of the play. Nevertheless, they went down 2-3 to Gothic in their home Eastern Counties League match on Saturday.

In patches the attack was forceful and the defence, under Frank Cruikshank's quiet but clever marshalling, was sound; but when it came to the final scoring move the attack crumbled promising mid-field movements.

The Gothic side was quietly effective and when on the attack they always looked dangerous.

The Jockeys can take comfort from the performance of two new players, goalkeeper Gawthrop (signed from Histon) and outside left Allan (an ex-King's Lynn player). Allan proved himself fast with a strong shot which he can let loose on the run, and he scored in the 28th minute to cut the lead given to Gothic by Franklin and Smith.

Gawthrop made several good saves, but one error, when he failed to hold a header, gave Gothic their first goal.

In the second half from the time Newmarket scored their equaliser through Grigg in the 47th minute play went all one way. Then a sudden breakaway unhinged the backs and Pierce scored to give the visitors both points.

Poor form by Musto and Morgan

Britain's gold medal hopes, Keith Musto and Tony Morgan, were a disappointing eighth in the first race of the Olympic Flying Dutchman yachting event today.

Musto, 28, and Morgan, 33, the European Flying Dutchman champions, could do no better than seventh place for most of the race and then they dropped back to eighth on the final leg.

Marino Caplo and Marco Sarpori, of Italy, in Aldebaras, finished first but their victory is subject to protest.

Britain finished fifth in the first race of the Dragon Class. The British crew of Martin Parry, Peter Reade and David Harris were sailing Andromeda.

Ole Bernsten, of Denmark, one of the favourites for the Dragon gold medal, won the race. Italy finished second and the United States third.

CARDIFF BUS MAN'S RECORD

CHUNG KUM WENG, a Cardiff bus driver, who is representing Malaysia in the Olympics, set a British Commonwealth record for the total lift in the featherweight class of the weightlifting today.

Chung was lying second after half the competitors had finished.

George Newton, 28-year-old Londoner, from whom he took the Commonwealth record, was in fifth place and so was out of the running for a medal.

Chung's new mark is 335 kilogrammes (738½ pounds) which is 2½ kilogrammes (5½ pounds) better than Newton's previous record.

Hockey team fail again

GREAT BRITAIN'S hockey team, crushed 7-0 by Australia in their opening match, went down 2-0 to New Zealand today. They had only themselves to blame for this second defeat which ended their chances of a place in the last four.

The team manager, Dr. Robin Fletcher, summed up his side's failure when he said: "They threw the game away. They had more of the play against a very ordinary side and could not score. I am very disappointed."

Even after making seven chances they totally lacked ruthlessness in a tournament which is likely to be contested at the close by the brilliant Indian and Pakistani side and the hard fast Australians and Germans. Pakistan, the champions, scored a comfortable 5-2 victory over Kenya today.

Britain were inside the New Zealand half for three-quarters of the match but could never penetrate an enthusiastic New Zealand defence. And, more important, they muffed six penalty corners, all taken by left-half Jim Deegan, who did not play yesterday.

By contrast, New Zealand had three real chances and took two of them, one in each half, first through their inside-left and captain, Phil Bygrave, and then through outside-right Ray Judge.

The match began with Britain looking determined to wipe out the memory of yesterday's defeat. After 10 minutes of British pressure, New Zealand found their feet and in the 12th minute inside-left Bygrave ran through four British defenders to nudge the ball past goalkeeper Paul Fishwick.

But Britain came back. Deegan hit a short corner which caused some confusion in the New Zealand ranks and right-back Alan Patterson saved on the line. The British's inside-left, Mike Corbett, had a fierce shot pushed over the bar.

On Britain's right wing John Cameron hit several good crosses but no other forwards could get near them.

Just before half-time Bygrave was stopped from scoring by a last-ditch effort from Britain's right-back John Neill.

Ten minutes after the start of the second half New Zealand's right-winger, Bruce Judge, scored a second goal in a so-called effort to level the score on the edge of the circle but regathered the ball and banged it past Fishwick.

The goal, scored against the run of play, underlined Britain's inability to take saving chances.

'Rock bottom' display by the City

ONCE again the supporters at Milton Road were let down when Cambridge City failed to take advantage of a weak visiting side and allowed Cheltenham to score two second-half goals to take both Southern League points on Saturday.

This time it was the defence that came in for criticism although, no doubt, they would have been left alone if the attack had done its job early on and made sure of a home win perhaps in the first half hour.

Even with the advantage of a goal lead, taken in the 26th minute, City could not hold on or improve upon their position against a side that played an even game. In the first period Cheltenham looked very ordinary, and it was not so much that they improved in the second half but that City deteriorated.

Rarely this season have we seen the City finish as they started a game. And this time the pessimism was justified after last Tuesday's spirited performance against Cambridge United, their play reached rock bottom and valuable points slipped away.

Changes

It seems time for a change of policy on the tonight's match at Milton Road in the Eastern Professional Floodlight competition. Several changes have been made. Eddie Bailham, making his League debut for City after being signed nine days ago from Shamrock Rovers, the Eire League club, scored the home side's only goal. This followed numerous errors awarded to City, so much were they on top in the early stages and so panicky was the Cheltenham defence that it was forced to kick anywhere. But the home forwards never pressed

home this advantage and Cheltenham were helped by an acrobatic display by their keeper, Barton. Bailham had a left footed shot tipped over the bar in the 25th minute and from Peter Bircumshaw's corner, McNally pushed the ball through and the centre forward was able to pivot and crash the ball home.

Mediocre

The rest of the half saw City playing well within themselves, and without being able to score again at least the defence was on top of its job and made the visitors attack look mediocre.

Even giving the fact that conditions were very unpleasant as City played against a driving rain in the second 45 minutes, there could be little excuse for the display turned in by a team that was leading and Cheltenham were allowed to score twice within six minutes.

As soon as the lights were switched on in the 57th minute, Ferns, the Cheltenham inside left, beat both centre half Alf Craig and right back Tommy Carroll to shoot past Bill Heath for the equaliser.

It was the same player who scored the winner in the 53rd minute. This time Cheltenham produced one move that gave the ball to right winger McGool. He was tackled several times by Brendan McNally without success and managed to get home his centre for Ferns to head into the net.

Reserves lose Rooney but revive to draw

AFTER being 3-1 down at half-time, Cambridge had a further setback when inside-left Bob Rooney was sent off, but, strangely enough, this proved to be the turning point for a Cambridge revival.

As soon as Rooney was off the field, left winger Billy Wall led the men to a series of non-stop onslaughts on the Chatham goal. Within a few minutes of the incident, centre-forward Kevin

Cornwell added to his first half goal by scoring from a Warboys cross.

Before this, however, Chatham looked like cruising home after winger Don Buxton bagged a "hat-trick". Cambridge could not pull back at that stage, even though Chatham lost full-back Bill Moys with an injury.

At half-time, however, the tables were turned, and Wall probed menacingly around the penalty box, while the rest of the team shook themselves out of their previous lethargy. It was Wall who gathered a loose ball halfway through the second half and pushed it across to inside-right Spears, who equalised.

Effervescent United bring back a well-earned point

YET another point was won by the sheer spirit of the effervescent U's. At times during their game at Guildford on Saturday they looked a beaten side. But twice they hit back from behind to equalise and finally came back to Cambridge with another valuable away point.

Now the U's have gone their last seven Southern League games without defeat and have collected ten points scoring ten goals and conceding four in the process.

Both the visitors' goals were scored by Graham Atkinson assisted by Peter Hobbs. The centre-forward typified the U's play. He did not stop running for the whole of the 90 minutes and although he often lacked the necessary "know-how" to beat French, he caused the centre half great discomfort.

For the first goal Hobbs was on hand to push a through ball from Kelly past French for Atkinson to score; and the second came when the centre-forward headed a corner from Haasz to the back of the penalty area for the inside forward to volley home.

Much of the game was a "back-to-the-wall" fight by United's defence. Fortunately the Guildford attack never commanded and they were held to two goals. It looked as if United's run had come to an end when, in the first minute, Guildford took the lead.

But the U's spirit came through and they equalised in the 18th minute. They made hard work in attack and the forwards were virtually reduced to a three-man formation. Day on the right was starved of the ball—in the first 45 minutes he received only three passes from his colleagues—and

Haasz was unable to produce his usual goalscoring magic.

Without the use of these men the visitors made a rod for their own backs. Because of this the attack often lacked method and although they had an equal share of the game the home side held the edge. Their Black's goal lacked more bite than their visitors' forays on the home goal.

Culprit

Guilford missed several chances and these allowed United to stage their comeback for a point. Main culprit was Stevens, the centre forward. He missed at least three chances that should have seen his side in an unassailable position.

But as the game wore on he was well shackled by Gibson and the home attack was rendered practically harmless.
