WHAT a wonderful fillip United received when they completely overwhelmed the powerful Chelmsford City side to win their first game in the Eastern Professional Floodlight League at Newmarket Road last night.

With the all-important F.A. Cup-tie against Bedford only four days away, the U's rested five of the team who have been playing in league matches and introduced the other members of the first team squad and still whipped a full-strength Chelmsford side. The win and the general spirit with which the U's played must have presented the manager, Roy Kirk, with selection problems for Saturday.

Gibson, in his first game at centre-half, looked as if he had always played in that position and Hobbs led the attack with great gusto.

With Boggis playing a fine game after settling his differences with the club, the only change from Saturday's team that looks at all likely for Saturday is for Gibson to remain at centre-half. Scurr could then move up to fill the right-half berth and Boggis come in at full-back.

Another first time success was Gerry Greene on the left. Making his first team debut he played with confidence and assurance and once a little steadiness has come with experience he should settle down well.

The Chelmsford side showed only two changes from the one that beat United 6-2 in a Southern League game at Newmarket Road a few weeks ago.

Wilson and Smille were never allowed to get moving and Butler the goal scorer of the side, was so well shackled that in the second half he was reduced to pushing and fouling. In the 82nd minute he was sent off when he landed a tremendous kick on Graham Lawrence. This incident marred a game which was clean except for a few minor incidents.

Eddie Bailham was City's inspiration

Romford 2, City 2.

CAMBRIDGE CITY'S new signing, centre-forward Eddie Bailham, formerly of Shamrock Rovers, was the star of this drawn match, the first for both clubs in the new Eastern Professional Floodlight League.

He scored first to put City in the lead and then, after Romford netted twice, he made the pass for Alan Spears to equalise and so snatch a valuable away point.

Barely a minute had gone by when he pounced on a defensive slip to shoot City ahead—and the second half was also barely a minute old when Bailham forged his way downfield, holding off the challenge of centre-half Rutter and wing-half Elias, slid across a perfect ball for inside right Spears to equalise Romford's two first-half goals.

Romford, hitherto always on the lookout for goals, were never the same force again. And Cambridge finished on the stronger note.

Yet, to be fair, if Romford's forwards had been able to shoot, Bailham and his fighting blue shirts would have toiled in vain. Jim Towers, recalled to Romford first team duty, missed a couple of glorious chances, so did centre forward Brown. Both hit the bar with headers, with City keeper Bill Heath groping. Cambridge somehow weathered the storm and looked the more likely to score after the interval.

Sanders was the star of the night, giving left back Poole a harassing time, but his crosses were wasted.

City's front line menace was always Bailham and if they had a winger like Romford's Sanders they could have sprung a surprise result.

Romford equalised Bailham's first goal in the 12th minute. Alf Cradock headed, but the offence went unchecked and Brown got the ball across for Towers to chest down and lash home in one move. Wright headed back a Sanders cross to equalise Romford ahead. It could have stayed that way—but for one moment of Bailham's brilliance at the start of the second half.
