

Half-pace U's far too good for Holbeach

A GAME Holbeach side were outplayed by Cambridge United last night in the second round of the East Anglian Cup at Newmarket Road. The U's were never extended and they scored their six goals without really exerting themselves.

There was no need to raise their game above walking pace and had the U's played any faster they must have doubled their score. Atkinson scored three of the goals—his second hat-trick of the season—Lawrence got two and Day one.

The pattern of the game was set in the opening seconds. Straight from the kick-off, Boggis won a corner and from the kick Lawrence was just wide. Still in the first minute Ure, in the visitors' goal, had to go to full stretch to save a header from Atkinson. Billy Day was in a tantalising mood, and David Frankish, Holbeach's 17-year-old full-back, was given the chasing of his life as the former Peterborough man left him standing with bewildering footwork.

Partial success

The experiment of playing Boggis at right-half was a partial success. In the first half he was all at sea in his new position, but as he got used to it he improved steadily and towards the end of the game he was showing signs that he might fit in at half-back.

It was hard to judge any of the U's players on this performance as they had no need to raise any urgency in their play and the game became little more than a run-out for them.

Holbeach who play in the United

Counties League, gave a spirited performance, but they were not clever enough to get anything like a fair share of the game. They were perhaps unlucky not to score in the 75th minute when Wells easily lobbed the ball over the advancing Smith, but his shot hit the bar and the United goalkeeper was able to turn and catch the rebound.

At this time United had already scored five of their goals and were contentedly waiting for the final whistle.

The first goal did not come until the 24th minute, when Lawrence made ground before pulling the ball back for Day, on the edge of the penalty area, casually to lob over the defence and goalkeeper into the net.

Holbeach hit back and Smith had to go to full stretch to save from Wells after a mistake by Wells had let the centre-forward through.

The second home goal was not scored until the stroke of half-time, when Atkinson sprinted through on a long pass from Day and ran round the goalkeeper before sliding the ball home.

The inside forward scored his second in the 55th minute, when he crashed home a pass from Graham Lawrence. Six minutes later Lawrence got the fourth, shooting home after snapping up a loose ball.

The best goal of the match came four minutes later, when Atkinson completed his hat-trick. Gibson made ground from his own half and split the Holbeach defence with a long through ball to Atkinson. The inside forward was expected to be managed to regain his balance and slide the ball wide of the advancing Ure. Lawrence finished the scoring when, with five minutes to go, he scored with a low shot from the edge of the penalty area.

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Varsity have a good side

THE Cambridge University soccer captain, George Clayton, is confident that this term has produced one of the best varsity teams in recent years. Certainly since the side has settled down under their coach, Terry Neil, the Arsenal and Ireland wing-half, they have gone forward in leaps and bounds.

They had a solid foundation in the nine Blues who stayed up this year and to these they have added two promising Freshmen, goalkeeper David Cobb and centre-half Terry Brown.

The bulk of the experienced players are in defence and this has proved valuable on more than one occasion. So far the side has started each game with defensive wing-halves and this has meant that the forwards have had to make their own chances.

But the scoring opportunities have been coming although many of them have been missed.

Spirit

Clayton insists that the side's main attribute is its spirit. "There is plenty of ability in the side and over the last two games the spirit has been building up and now we are playing together as a team," he said.

However, in their match against Arsenal at Grange Road, yesterday, the Light Blues did not have much opportunity to shine against a side like their opponents. The visitors were never extended and the experience of four first team players in the Arsenal side was too much for the eager Varsity side.

True, the professional side did not score their three goals until the last quarter, by which time the University defenders had run themselves into the ground.

The Light Blues must have a great chance in the Varsity match but Oxford are even more fortunate than their rivals in that they have 11 Blues up again. So far this season, however, their form has been disappointing and they have never moulded together as a team.

When it comes to the big day previous form means little, Clayton said. "But these matches are so often won on the wings and I think this is where we have the edge. We have two good wing men and Oxford have been

weak at full-back. In Chadd and Turnbull we will have probably the two most experienced players on the field.

"Whatever the result I think that this Varsity match will be the best for the last five or six years."

Clayton, himself, and D. Richardson, of St. John's, the two inside forwards, are the brains of the side and between them they also provide a lot of the punch. In the middle is R. Cutler, of Christ's, and on the wings, D. Barnwell, the secretary from Christ's and M. Sayer, of Pembroke.

S. Z. Szemerényi (Christ's) and P. Skinner (Pembroke) are two steady wing halves and C. Turnbull and R. Chadd, the Christ's pair at full-back will take a lot of beating in the Varsity match. D. Cobb (St. Catharine's) the former Cambridge Grammar schoolboy who is at present playing in Newmarket Town's Eastern Counties League side, is keeping goal with a lot of confidence.

Yesterday Cobb made several first class saves from the Arsenal forwards although he tended to make some shots look harder than they were.

The match was marred by an unfortunate accident to Arsenal keeper, Bob Wilson. He collided with his centre-half, Ferry, in the first half and had to leave the field and took no further part in the game.

Experienced

His place was taken by wing-half Peter Simpson. Both players have had experience in the First Division side this season. Fred Clarke, at full-back, and centre-half Gordon Ferry were the two other Arsenal players with first team experience.
