Oxford to reclaim Atkinson

GRAHAM ATKINSON, Cambridge United F.C.'s star inside forward and leading goalscorer, may be forced to quit the Newmarket Road club and return to Oxford United.

This body blow for United was revealed today after Arthur Turner, the Oxford manager, wrote to Roy Kirk, his counterpart at the Abbey Stadium, saying that he would be reclaiming the player in the near future.

He would do this under the terms of the contract drawn up when Atkinson joined United at the beginning of last season. It was not a complete transfer as the player was only brought to Cambridge on loan and Oxford stipulated that they could recall him at any time.

Arthur Turner told a "Cambridge News" reporter: "I was friendly with Alan Moore, who was manager of the Southern League club at the time, and I knew he was very keen on Graham Atkinson so I let the player go to Cambridge on loan. Now he has matured and is playing better than before and so I would like to recall him to Oxford. Although the move is not imminent I will definitely get him back before the end of the present season."

Key man

Naturally this has upset Roy Kirk who will have to find a replacement if the player moves. He has gathered a settled forward line and now he looks like losing a key man.

"It would be easier if it came at the end of a season but now the season is so far advanced I will have trouble finding a suitable replacement. Anyway the right player would cost a lot of money," the manager said.

There is one loophole, however, for United. If the player does not want to move he cannot be forced, as he would have to sign a new contract with Oxford. So the final decision must rest with him. "I am very happy here and feel that I am playing better since I joined Cambridge United," Atkinson said. "Naturally I must listen to Arthur Turner's offer before deciding, but it will have to be an attractive one to make me leave Cambridge."

Promoted Leeds lose £84,930

A RECORD loss of £84,930 for the year ended July 31 is reported by Leeds United today.

Leeds gained promotion to Division One, but in doing so had a net expenditure on transfers of £23,400. During the season they signed Alan Peacock from Middlesbrough and Johnny Giles from Manchester United.

The club's wage bill rose from £55,903 to £99,434, but at a time of declining gates, the Leeds figures from the turnstiles rose from £29,725 to £115,890.

Luton Town are giving a month's trial starting tomorrow to Ken Barton, the former Spurs full-back, who has a free transfer.
