

United in control of 'Derby' match

Cambridge United 2, Cambridge City 0. (Attendance 4,799)

A MARGIN of two goals was a fair representation of Cambridge United's superiority over Cambridge City in the Eastern Professional Floodlight League game at Newmarket Road last night.

After the first 10 minutes the home side took control and it was not until the last quarter that City really came into their own and then United's defence proved capable.

Neither side was at full strength with players being rested or missing the match through injury. The game, as a spectacle, was marred by the high wind that made ball control difficult and early on it became evident that the side that fought the wind more effectively would be half way towards winning the game.

City put the ball into the air too much, especially when they were playing into the wind, whereas their opponents kept the ball on the ground.

Misses

After Clayton, the University skipper, playing at inside left, had missed two possible early chances for the City, United took a grip on the game and Slack, after a great save from Clayton, did not see much of the ball until late in the second half.

Heath, however, in the other goal, did not have such a happy evening. He dived too late to save a hopeful shot from Gibson for the first goal and in the second half dropped the ball twice and had to move smartly to regain it as home forwards rushed in.

One of United's main assets was the ability of their defence to foot-ball their way out of trouble without using the big boot and this meant that they kept possession and were able to build up their attacks.

City did not seem to realise this and, although the defence played well enough, usually got rid of the ball by using long kicks. But, on that City attack it seemed that if they played until midnight they would not score. Moore and Clayton were the main culprits on the miss parade and they blazed the ball everywhere out on target.

Dangerous

United, however, looked dangerous whenever they moved into the attack and early in the second half Heath was brought to his knees by a plectrived from Finch. McGugan was City's saviour on many occasions although, early in the game, Hobbs managed to draw him out of the middle. The centre half tightened up considerably later to stem the United tide.

Jones followed up his outstanding game at Bedford with another first class performance and he gave Willie Devine an uncomfortable outing on his return to Newmarket Road.

City started as though they were going to score quick goals and within 30 seconds Craig put Clayton through but the inside forward scooped the ball well over the top. Three minutes later Clayton again broke through. This time his shot was on target but the consistent Slack was master of the situation and dived to save.

This was all the visitors had to offer and gradually Welsh and Finch turned the tide in United's favour. The U's took the lead when

Gibson tried a snap shot from the edge of the penalty area in the 14th minute. Heath completely misjudged the ball and dived far too late to prevent a goal. The City keeper when he masterfully turned a fierce shot from McVittie over the bar.

The City defence started to struggle. Their main tactic was the offside trap, in which the United forwards kept being caught.

Atkinson finally signed for Oxford last night after leaving the League club's offer for a week. It could be a triumphant return to Oxford for Atkinson. He was originally released because the Headington crowd barracked him and it was affecting his play. Now he might well step straight into the first team in the Division Four match at Crewe on Saturday.

Arthur Turner, the Oxford manager, said this morning: "I have eight players injured at the moment and I am seriously considering playing Graham at Crewe. I know he has the ability—which he has already proved this season."

Cambridge United officials were unable to do much to stop the deal going through as Turner held the whiphand.

When the player was transferred to Newmarket Road two years ago, he only signed on loan and Oxford held an option to recall him at any time. Since he has been playing so well

this season in the Southern League, the Oxford manager has taken an interest in him and, at the same time, that he had been playing in the League club.
