Mike Smith, who had been in for more than two hours for 32, and Tom Cartwright, were at the wicket when tea was taken. Only tallenders David Brown and Robin Hobbs remained.

Lively seam bowling on a wearing pitch, aided by fine wicket-keeping by Denis Gamsy, who held five catches, accounted for M.C.C.'s batting collapse.

### Early shock

The touring team had an early shock when pace-man Halse bowled Mike Brearley in the second over with a ball that gathered pace off the pitch.

When Trimborn replaced Halse, the move quickly met with success, Boycott edging the new bowler low down and Gamsy held a good catch.

Boycott became the second M.C.C. batsman to pass 1,000 runs on the tour during his innings.

In a Commons statement in reply
