Cambridge City hope to return to winning form when Hastings visit Milton Road tomorrow, but Cambridge United are hampered by injuries for their trip to Dartford.

City make only one change from the side that has been together for several weeks, apart from Wednesday's match with King's Lynn when several were rested, Alan Gregory being preferred at inside-left to Brian Hart.

Gregory had a good game at The Walks and makes a return against a side already beaten 3-0 in Sussex. Indeed, Hastings started a good run for City at the end of October and officials hope that they might oblige again tomorrow.

Change of luck?

The club has lost its last three Southern League matches—two away and one at home—and drew at Wellington before that. A spokesman said this morning: "The boys have been slightly unlucky recently; we hope the luck will change tomorrow and that we shall get both points."

City's team is Heath, Carroll, Poole, Pearce, McGugan, McNally, Spears, Moyle, Bailham, Gregory, Wall. No fewer than seven United players are doubtful for the match against Dartford. The manager, Roy Kirk, has a roll call 45 minutes before the coach leaves in the morning and will select his side when his fitness tests have been carried out.

Long 'casualty' list

Hugh Barr has a broken nose and is a definite non-starter on medical advice. Billy Welsh still has strained ligaments in his knee; Bill Kelly has a pulled muscle; Dennis Randall is down with flu; Johnny Haasz has suspected tonsillitis; Billy Day has a bruised

ankle; and Dai Jones has a bruised foot.

"Twenty-four hours can make a difference to quite a few of these players," Roy Kirk said this morning, "but I shall not know the answers until the morning. It is a disappointment, but I have enough promising youngsters to get over the difficulties if the worst comes to the worst." Cambridge City Reserves travel to Dunstable for a Metropolitan League game, the first between the two clubs this season.

Tribute from Alliss

Andrew Blows and David Butler, the young amateur-professional partnership from the Gog Magog Club, bowed out of the Wentworth foursomes golf tournament late yesterday, beaten 2 and 1 in the third round by the strong Parkstone pair, Donald Holmes and the Ryder Cup player, Peter Alliss.

It was a disappointing end to a good run for Blows and Butler and the match could have gone either way until the last shot. By winning the long first with a birdie four, they stood one up until losing the fourth. A long putt by Alliss, a master on the tricky, wet Wentworth green, at the sixth and ninth resulted in the Cambridge pair being two down at the turn. After a run of halves at the next three holes, Blows and Butler reduced the arrears to one hole with a par four. A good chip from Blows wiped out the deficit at the 14th, only for them to fall behind yet again when Blows was bunkered at the next. At this hole they took an unlucky six—their first of the tournament.

When Alliss and Holmes won the 16th to go two up, victory was within their grasp for the first time. Finally, a half at the 17th was good enough to give the Parkstone pair victory. For their efforts Blows and Butler earned this tribute from Alliss: "They are a good pair and tough opponents. Disappointed David Butler, however, summed the match up best when he said: "It was such a pity, it could have gone to either pair."

County bowlers almost do it

Visting the Falcon Bowling and Social Club at Chelmsford yesterday, the Cambridgeshire County Bowling Executive came very close to being the first visiting team to gain a victory over the Essex Executive.

The newly-erected 5-rink indoor bowling green, which has a jute carpet and a speed comparable to that of a good outdoor green, was opened just twelve months ago. Already the club boasts an indoor membership of 650 bowlers.

Cambridgeshire were leading on only one rink after 5 ends had been played and were ten shots in arrears—a margin that was

increased to twelve shots at the half-way stage.

In view of the fact that this type of green was a new experience for the Cambridgeshire players, it was rather surprising when they recovered to take the lead after 15 ends (71-70), three of their five rinks having forged ahead. The Essex players, however, fought back strongly in the final ends to gain victory by 15 shots with the score 106-91. Essex invited their visitors to make the fixture an annual one.

Dexter and Lees beaten 2 and 1

Ted Dexter, England's Test cricketer, hobbling with a sprained right ankle, and his partner Arthur Lees (Sunningdale), the 57-year-old Ryder Cup player, went down to a 2 and 1 defeat in the fourth round of the amateur-professional foursomes golf tournament at Wentworth, Surrey, today.

They were beaten by the home club pair 22-year-old Dudley Milne and Ryder Cup international, Tom Haliburton. Dexter and Lees, favourites after their magnificent play yesterday put up a great fight but the odds were too heavy against them.

The England cricketer slipped on some stairs at his home last evening and sprained his ankle. He was up most of the night and had his ankle strapped up. He could never have walked around the 6,977 yards course and played only because Mr. T. S. Crabtree, last year's Wentworth captain, loaned him his electric buggy car. "I was determined to play because I love the game and for Arthur's sake," said Dexter. "But I could not put any weight on to the ankle and pulled many of my strokes."

Richard Davies, the 21-year-old assistant at South Herts, and Norman Smith, who is also a member of the Saffron Walden club, brought off a fine win at the 21st hole over Geoffrey Hunt (Hartsbourne C.C.) a Ryder Cup player, and Jimmy Simpson.
