

# United snatch points with two late goals

Two goals in the final nine minutes gave Cambridge United victory over Tonbridge in the Southern League match at Newmarket Road last night.

After trailing twice, United looked a greater side but twice Day worked his old magic and left Lovell floundering behind him and Randall and Barr were on hand to net.

The turning point of the game came nine minutes from time when a cross from Day was charged down. The winger lobbed the rebound into the middle. The

Tonbridge players thought the ball was out of play but Randall, playing to the whistle, put it into the net and the linesman, right in line, said the goal was fair.

Then, with three minutes to go, Day swept past Lovell again and, Barr racing to the near post, nodded the ball home.

The home side just about deserved their two points. They pressed for most of the first half and were in command for the first 20 minutes and for most of the second half.

Randall gave a tremendous per-

formance on his return after injury. It is remarkable how much he has changed during the last month. Earlier in the season he could do little right but now he is tearing defences apart.

Gerry Graham considerably tightened the defence although it still gave away a goal in the second half. Generally, however, it looked sounder than in recent weeks.

Tonbridge broke away and went ahead from a free kick. Bowman took the kick and rolled the ball sideways to Truett, who hit a powerful shot from 25 yards that went into goal through a wall of defenders.

## In command

The second half, with United attacking their favourite Newmarket Road end, started in sensational style. Within 30 seconds of the start McVittie lobbed the ball over the defence and Randall outran the centre half to score.

Three minutes later Randall hit the post from the narrowest of angles after beating Crump with a great run. Then, with United in complete command, Scurr missed an open goal from a centre by Day.

The home side seemed to lose heart as they failed to turn chances into goals and when Simmons left the field 15 minutes from time with badly strained stomach muscles the visitors were inspired.

All the half Crump had been putting huge kicks down the middle of the field and the defence had been letting the ball run to Slack. But Francis moved into the middle in the 70th minute and guided the ball past Slack.

United looked a beaten side but they hit back strongly and the two goals from Randall and Barr were enough to give them both points.

Although the Rovers had established a two-goal lead early in the second half, Newmarket refused to admit to defeat and their persistence was underlined when they scored seconds before the final whistle. True it was an own goal, Hart helping the ball in from a right-wing corner, but it was a just reward for the Jockeys' forwards, who had worked hard throughout.

Several times Johnny Brooks' speed put him in a scoring position but he showed very poor finishing ability. The same could be said too of Cruickshank who fired wide of an empty goal and the other Newmarket forwards who looked to

have lead in their boots when it came to scoring.

After their more glittering win at Sudbury two nights earlier Haverhill were disappointing. Fans who were there in good numbers, had expected them to run the young Newmarket side into the ground. The moves were there in theory and there were some flashes of good play from Fayemi and Winney but strategy which promised a lot came to grief all too often by slackness in the final pass.

The goal which put them ahead came after 16 minutes, wing half Ian Coleman gathering a penetrating pass from Abbott and steering the ball wide of Cobb.

Haverhill went further ahead 15 minutes after the restart, Fayemi's swinging shot from the left finding Siddall, who netted from close range.

# Cambridge robbed by penalty

Cambridge 11 pts, Public School Wanderers 13

Two heavily weakened sides contrived to play some exciting, open Rugby on a hard ground at Grantchester Road last night. Cambridge looked set for a welcome win and led 11-5 at half-time, but in the second half the visitors lasted the pace better.

The visitors included two internationals, P. Sukko (Holland) and G. Van Vurren (Rhodesia), and an All Black triallist, Z. Tomes, while Paul Goodman came back in the centre for City after a long lay-off to show much of his old flair and speed.

Cambridge took the lead after five minutes. From an infringement in a five-yard scrum City were awarded a penalty and Bryn

Jenkins kicked accurately from a wide angle.

After 20 minutes, Jenkins did it again, this time kicking from 35 yards with the wind in his favour.

Despite a performance of brilliance and perception by the Public Schools' scrum-half, 19-year-old David Bright, Cambridge were becoming markedly the better side in their open approach work.

In the 25th minute, Goodman started a scoring move which he himself finished with a good try. Passing to Dimambro, he neatly

took a return from Lowe as the skipper delayed his pass, as Jenkins put over a good kick for the conversion.

Seven minutes later Tomes plunged over through half the City defence to reduce arrears, and he converted the try himself.

Shortly after half-time, Leightner got a try for the visitors which was converted, and Gill, on the right-wing, kicked a penalty 7 minutes from the end to rob Cambridge of victory.

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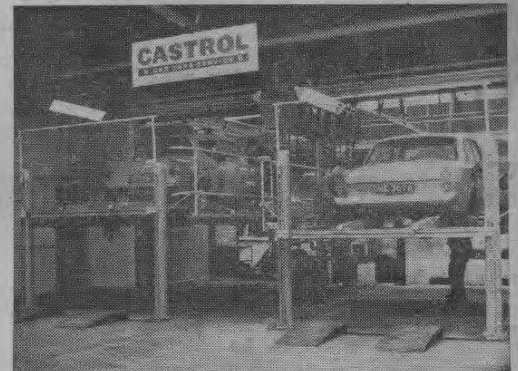
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# Coughing cuts runners to 49

Only 49 runners were declared out of 110 possibles to run at Cheltenham tomorrow, and the major cause of the withdrawals is the coughing epidemic.

About a third of the 4,000 horses in the stables in the racecourse will be sprayed with disinfectant before and after each horse is quartered. Saddling stalls will be specially treated.

Nevertheless, many local trainers will not have a runner. Next week Capt. Cecil Boyd-Rochfort's team will be coughing today, and a spokesman for Bernard van Cutsem said: "One in three of ours is affected. It is a pretty gloomy picture."

"Well Packed has travelled down to Cheltenham from Nottingham where he suffered a shock defeat by the 50-1 chance Abbottsbury Abbot. He runs in the Gratwick Blagrove Memorial Challenge Cup tomorrow and may be worth another chance."

## Course winners

"The small line-up will include course and distance winners Moretons and Staggered as well as the consistent Turpoley-based five-year-old Number Please."

"The biggest field tomorrow afternoon, 10 contests Division Two of the Spring Handicap Hurdle, and the pair I like best in this event are Starbee and the locally trained See and Go."

Starbee, twice a winner earlier in the campaign, went close to winning the Ansell's Brewery Hurdle at Hereford 17 days ago, when sharing second place with Naswarshore, some four lengths behind the winner Jacamar.

See and Go's recent form has been rather disappointing but he was successful in a novices' event at Cheltenham last Christmas.

## Safer bet

"I think Starbee represents the safer bet tomorrow."

"Magic Orb, a game winner over the course and distance in November, but a failure twice since, is out to repeat last year's success in the Holman Cup with 10lb less on his back."

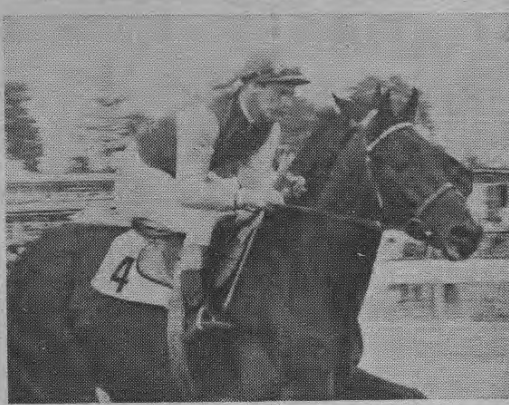
Although the opposition will include the Ripon stayer Prudent Barney and the useful New Pin, I fancy Magic Orb will again show his liking for the track with another win."

# No danger of Craven meeting being off

At Lambourn the coughing seems to be in the decline, having run through the area. Fred Winter, Peter Walwyn, David Hastings, Ian Lomax and Bill Payne are clear, but other trainers still have some horses in trouble.

In Yorkshire about a quarter of the 250 horses quartered near Middleham are, or have been, coughing.

Neville Crump states that the position is improving, but Sam Hall's string seems badly hit.

The cough takes at least 10 days to run its course and the horses get fairly high temperatures. On average, once a horse contracts the disease, it takes about three weeks to get him back on the racecourse.

A spokesman for the Jockey Club said today: "If there are any runners at all at a race meeting, the meeting will take place. It is up to trainers to decide whether they want to risk infection by running their horses."

One bright spot is that on present form, most stables ought to be clear and back in full swing in time for the Easter weekend, when racing has been arranged at 25 centres.

# Note Suvretta in Greenham

From our Newmarket correspondent.

I have never seen Newmarket Heath so deserted on a Wednesday (normally a busy galloping morning) at this time of the year when a new flat-racing season has just begun. The reason for it is, of course, the coughing epidemic which is raging through the stables like wildfire.

This will, unfortunately, have a very serious effect on the Craven Meeting next week for it will almost certainly result in the size of the fields being much smaller than they would have been.

The stables of F. Armstrong, C. Boyd-Rochfort, B. Hobbs, W. Holden, E. Lambton, H. Leader, J. Oxley, W. O'Gorman, J. Watts, John Waugh, J. A. Toynhill, W. Wharton and F. Winter are the worst hit in Newmarket, and it now seems doubtful if they will field many runners next week.

Having talked with several Newmarket trainers on the subject of coughing, I am led to believe that any horse that has been coughing recently or is still doing so now could be off the course until the end of the month or the beginning of May.

## No runners

John Oxley will have no runners next week and will probably not make a start until the Guineas meeting.

It seems, therefore, a waste of time looking ahead to discussing next week's Craven Meeting in detail because trainers' plans are, understandably, upside down just at this moment. Instead, I have compiled a list of horses who may be worth keeping an eye on in the coming months.

I have compiled the list from a number of horses that I spotted either on a tour of the stables or out at exercise.

In Ipswich Flambée Alan Adare and Biomydrin, Noel Mureless has three colts who could reach classic standard.

Kirsch Flambée was backward when he ran at Foothill in the Harris Hill Stakes at Newbury last Autumn. He is still backward but he should improve in time.

Alan Adare will tell us if he is to be considered for the 2,000 Guineas when the season (all being well) in the Free Handicap next week. This attractive Alcide colt looks a picture.

Biomydrin has never won but if he lives up to his breeding he should do well for he is by Ballymoss out of that top-class race mare Collyria.

## Good mover

Geoffrey Brooke has a good mover in the Russian colt Hassan, an impressive filly called Aurinda who is shaping well in her gallops at home.

Pushful and Timber King strike me as having done as well physically as any in Walter Wharton's yard.

Pushful was only lightly raced as a three-year-old due to injury sustained when he fell in the yard but he looks much stronger and more mature than a year ago, and could make his presence felt in top-class company.

Timber King is also much stronger than he was a year ago and he could make up into a pretty formidable stayer this season.

It is a shame that Enrioo is coughing for I thought that Bruce Hobbs' colt would put us in the 2,000 Guineas picture when he ran in the Free Handicap. Instead, we will have to wait and watch him at home.

Providing that he escapes the cough, stable companion Suvretta could give us a lead or guide to the strength of Hobbs' three-year-olds when he runs in the Greenham at Newbury.

## Bright maidens

Ted Leader has a couple of bright maidens prospecting in Full Glory and Light Look. The former ran unplaced at Nottingham on Monday, but he should improve in time.

Light Look will always want good ground and with conditions in his favour he should win sprint races this season.

Coughing has put the brake on Captain Boyd-Rochfort's plans, but don't forget Canisbay and Call of the Wild later in the season, for they were working well.

Jack Watts' colt Super Sam did us a good turn last year and I am hopeful that he will have made normal improvement from two to three during the winter. As he comes from a late maturing family, he might make more than normal improvement in which case he could be a good-class handicap over 10 furlongs.

Lord Derby has a good-looking colt called Look Sharp to carry his colours in top-class three-year-old races this season. Trainer Bernard Cutts has never been disappointed with Look Sharp's running in the Dewhurst last season after his promising effort first time out at Newbury. But Look Sharp has been a bit out of form since Spring, so his stable companion Gary Bay who should pick up a small maiden race or two.

## Unknown quantity

One does not often get a filly as good as Homeward Bound running as a four-year-old, and in Machella, John Oxley has one who should win good-class races. As good, however, she is an unknown quantity.

Teddy Lambton's maidens Inquisitor and Resolved are worth keeping an eye on. The latter has never won but she shapes well.

Big Ben, a half-brother to Krakenwag and Whistling Buoy, could continue Jack Clayton's run of successes later in the season.

Jack Jarvis' two grey three-year-olds Dunlin and her trainer Geoff Barling is hopeful that she will go well.

His main concern now is shedding the weight he has put on since his enforced idleness. At the present moment he scales 9st 3lb and has to get down to 7st 13lb in eight stone.

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# Luck deserted the Scots again

The third and most important leg of the hoped-for treble Tracey McCarron arrived safe and sound last week and weighed in at a healthy 6 lb. 14 oz.

Whether the future of Aintree is going to be that of Bogsie is signed and sealed and soon to be no more. Before this little Scottish course disappears the Scottish Grand National will be staged there for the last time a week on Saturday.

Do not be surprised if Bishop Auckland trainer Arthur Stephenson wins it for the third time with his selected Major Hitch and Superweight. He has taken out his National third, Mr. Jones.

Incidentally, did you remember that up to eight days before the National, Arthur also gained the fourth, Rainbow Battle?

Several people who watched the Grand National on television have told me how they warmed to the old-world courtesy and sportsmanship of Reg Tweedie. Tweedie was seen pushing his way through the crowd to reach and congratulate American owner Mrs. Mary Stephenson after her Jay Trump had beaten his Freddie in that never-to-be-forgotten finish.

It was a atrocious luck for the Tweedies that the year their small Gordon, Berwickshire, string had produced a horse able to beat all his fellow countrymen in the big race there was to be a long trans-Atlantic raider just too good for him at the weights.

Scots in general must be feeling that where the National is concerned horses from their side of the border are always

unlucky. Macmoffat was second in successive years (1939 and '40) and Wyndburgh was runner-up in 1957, 1959 and 1962. It was pleasant, too, to hear Freddie's rider, Pat McCarron, so full of praise for the gameness of his mount after his narrow defeat.

Some time ago I wrote that March could be the most momentous month ever for the McCarrons. Pat had a chance of winning the Champion Hurdle again on Magic Court as well as the National on Freddie. Such was not to be, but his wife, Maureen, made no mistake with
