are too many local "Derby" games to look forward to and so much of the glamour and curiosity has gone. Last night the play lacked a fire possibly because the atmosphere was missing.

On balance a draw was a fair result and, afterwards, the two managers seemed satisfied. Each side scored one good goal, their first; the others were "soft". United led twice, but twice City equalised, once in each period.

Without waiting to settle down both sides tried to play open football at the start, but the moves were mobile rather than creative. Ward was the first to put a keeper in danger—his own, with a bad pass-back.

United's lead came in only the seventh minute. Baker started the move in his own half by beating McVittie before slipping the ball to Finch. The full-back's pass beat the City defence to go to the unmarked Amato. Without a hesitation the inside forward crouched and picked his spot to head home, with Caine looking on helplessly.

Play began to look scrappy, but there were plenty of thrills to keep both the Cambridge camps happy.

It was United's turn to make a defensive blunder in the 16th minute. McVittie was allowed to roll the ball forward and Wall in the middle, swung his right foot to beat the diving Slack.

Carroll did well to block a shot

from left-winger Hobbs while at the other end, Gregory had a chance but the ball came on his wrong foot.

Escape

The luckiest escape so far helped United to stay level. In the 38th minute Ward's corner from the right kept low and beat all the players in the penalty box, including Moyses, who completely missed his shot from two yards.

There was still nothing between the two sides as the interval arrived.

Twice, in as many minutes after half-time, City players, Moyses and Bailham, volleyed the ball over the United's bar when each might have put City into the lead.

After more pressure from City, United took the lead for the second time when Hobbs scored in the 54th minute. Their centre-forward, Turley, thrust the ball into the middle, where the left-winger, Hobbs, sold a dummy to get the ball on his strong foot and then blasted it into the corner of the net. Caine went for it far too late because he was both out of position and unsighted.

City were often too indecisive in both attack and defence, although Gregory was unlucky when his full-blooded drive hit the post in the 60th minute.

United were employing the fast break-away to great advantage, often outstripping defenders in dashes downfield.

'Soft' equaliser

In contrast, little was seen of Bailham as Baker policed the centre of the penalty area and kept City's leader in handcuffs.

At the other end, Turley shot just wide.

City equalised in the 74th minute in "soft" fashion. From a free kick taken by Dennis, Walls was left all alone and his shot hit Slack to trickle inside the far post.

Two years for this amateur

Among the encouraging features of National Hunt racing is the growing band of enthusiastic amateur riders.

It is a healthy trend, for, besides the active part these amateur riders take during their youth, they bring, throughout a lifetime, plenty of stock into the sport — and race meetings cannot be run successfully without horses.

An amateur who has come right into the headlines this year is 25-year-old Christopher Collins, the six-foot tall son of the millionaire owner of the Goya Perfume Company.

Christopher's love of horses and riding was too strong to allow him to settle down too soon to the safe routine of his profession as a chartered accountant, so he has compromised and allowed himself a limited period in which to lead the precarious life of a jump-jockey.

He says: "I have given myself two years as an amateur rider, during which time I hope to achieve as much as possible."

Trains three

Christopher, an old Etonian, has certainly entered the venture wholeheartedly. He has 13 horses stabled throughout the country, and he trains three himself at Great Missenden, Bucks.

Already Christopher has nine winning rides to his credit, five of them this season, and, like every jump jockey, his great ambition is to ride a Grand National winner, a feat he went close to accomplishing at his first attempt last March when he rode Mr. Jones into third place behind Jay Trump and Freddie.

Unfortunately, Mr. Jones, who could well have taken Christopher into first place in this season's National, met with a fatal accident in his next race, falling at the 15th fence when leading in the Welsh Grand National at Chepstow.

Mare who broke leg and lived

One early morning on the gallops, a promising two-year-old bay filly named Ringstead Bay was being ridden in a fast sprint with R. C. Sturdy's string by a sporting Amesbury fishmonger, Mr. Don Blakely. Suddenly there was a horrible loud crack and the filly faltered and fell, her near foreleg shattered.

Trainer and lads gathered round. There was nothing to be done. The saddle and bridle were eased off her as she lay, and the trainer hurried off to get the vet to shoot her.

While Don waited sadly beside her, suddenly the little filly bravely struggled to her feet, shuffled round and took a few faltering steps on three legs towards her distant stable.

Without quite knowing why, Don Blakely was determined that the filly would not be shot. When the trainer returned with the vet, Don pleaded for her life. It was pointed out there was no real alternative. She was on open downland where no horsebox could be brought, a good two miles from her stable. Her leg would almost certainly not mend, even if she were slung and if it did, she would still be useless either for riding or breeding.

Tedious

However, Don bent under her and, supporting her useless foreleg in his arms, took the weight of the filly on his back. He acted as her fourth leg for tedious step after tedious step. It took over eight hours to move the courageous little filly off the downs. Both man and animal were utterly exhausted, but neither gave up.

Eventually Ringstead Bay was back in her stable. A sling was fixed. The vet, though he still disapproved, gave the filly pain-killing injections.

During the anxious days that followed the filly went sadly back in condition, and would eat only if Don fed her a little crushed chlorey by hand. Worse was to follow. A week later the sling gave way and Ringstead Bay was precipitated to the floor, unable to rise.

Even then Don would not give up. "It would have been like asking someone to shoot a good friend," he said. He packed straw round her and made her as comfortable as possible; though even he was now doubtful of the outcome.

Every day, when he went to ride work for Sturdy, he went straight to the filly. She was no better.

"Then one morning I got the greatest thrill of my life. I looked down the line of boxes, where all the horses' heads were out, and I thought 'It can't be,' and I ran like hell. There she was on her feet, with her head up over the door."

Remarkable

This remarkable greengrocer (now 56 years old) was never on a horse's back until he was well over 40, and the first horse he ever rode was a racehorse, who ran away with him. "I didn't know enough to be frightened," he said.

Herbert Donald Blakely was born in Herefordshire, but all his grandparents were Irish. They had nothing, as far as he knows, to do with horses. His father was an auctioneer at Kington, on the Welsh borders.

Don volunteered for the R.A.F., was a survivor of the bombing of the troopship Lancastria in 1940, served as a flight engineer with 10th Squadron in the Desert in Stirling bombers and finished up with Wellingtons in 70 Squadron in Rimini. He was twice mentioned in despatches.

On their last operational flight the air-crew were talking about Ringstead Bay, after a fall year, is again in foal and Don is in a dilemma. Come hell or high water, he would never part with Ringstead Bay. He also now owns Cockeyed Hat, the old warrior whom he had his win, who is training with Colonel Vallance Devides.

In foal

But a working greengrocer cannot afford to keep a string of horses, even though the trainer for whom he rides works every day and many others of his numerous friends are kind to him. Unless he can find someone who will lease or go shares in a wonder filly, he will have to sell Philolive.
