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## Another big fight for Rudkin

The London boxing promoter, Mr. Harry Levene, today predicted a home world title chance for the British and Empire bantam-weight champion, Alan Rudkin, if he continues to produce the form he showed in outpointing Felipe Gonzalez, at the Royal Albert Hall, London, last night.

Levene, who promotes Rudkin's next fight at Belle Vue, Manchester, on January 31, said: "I was so impressed by Rudkin's performance last night that I am immediately opening negotiations to try to get the world champion, Fighting Harada, over here this year."

"Rudkin took him close in Tokio in November and, although some people think he will not chance it over here, money will talk. I am practically certain I can get him."

Rudkin has been matched in Manchester with another Mexican, Edmundo Esparza, who, Levene claims, is one of three men who have beaten Harada. The fight is over 10 rounds at 8 stone 8 lb.

On the same programme, Johnny Pritchett, the British middleweight champion, takes his most ambitious step so far with a 10-rounds fight against the middleweight champion of Italy, Fabio Bettini.

In a 10-rounds featherweight fight, Frankie Taylor, the No. 1 contender for Howard Winstone's British title, meets one of Winstone's old opponents, Dos Santos, of Brazil.

Winstone outpointed the Brazilian in January, 1962, but not before he had been put on the floor for the first time in his professional career.

### Plans for Curvis

The fight will be Taylor's first since last July.

The next step in the career of Brian Curvis, the British and Empire welterweight champion, after his fourth round win over Jose Stable (Cuba) at the Royal

Albert Hall last night, is likely to be a European championship fight with the Frenchman, Jean Joslin.

Curvis's manager, Mr. Arthur Boggis, said today: "The fight has been nominated by the European Boxing Union, and I am in touch with a French promoter who wants to stage it in Paris. I have also had a fair offer from London, where I would naturally prefer the fight to take place. One way or the other, we are likely to sign up within a couple of days. I consider that such a fight would be a logical step to our next ambition, a return with Emile Griffith for the world title."

Curvis, who went to hospital after the fight to have three stitches in a head wound received in the first round, still has designs on the middleweight division. If the Griffith fight fails to materialise, he will be in pursuit of the British middleweight champion, John Pritchett, who also fought and won last night, although not too impressively.

## World flyweight bout

The Argentinian, Horacio Accavallo, and Japan's Hiroyuki Ebihara signed in Tokio today for their world flyweight boxing title fight in Tokio on February 1.

Kotai Kiuchi, secretary-general of the Japanese Boxing Commission, said: "The fight will decide once and for all who is the rightful world champion."

Mr. Kikuchi added that the Jap-

anese commission would not recognise the coming fight in London between Walter McGowan (Britain) and Salvatore Burruni (Italy) as a world title fight.

And we will not agree to the winner of that fight meeting the winner of the Tokio bout to settle any issue," he commented.

The executive committee of the European Boxing Union (E.B.U.) announced in Milan on Sunday that it would recognise the winner of the McGowan-Burruni fight as world champion provided he fought the winner of the Accavallo-Ebihara bout.

Burruni will meet McGowan in London on either March 15 or April 26. Burruni was stripped of the world flyweight title by the World Boxing Council and the World Boxing Association for failing to defend his crown against Ebihara within a stipulated time.

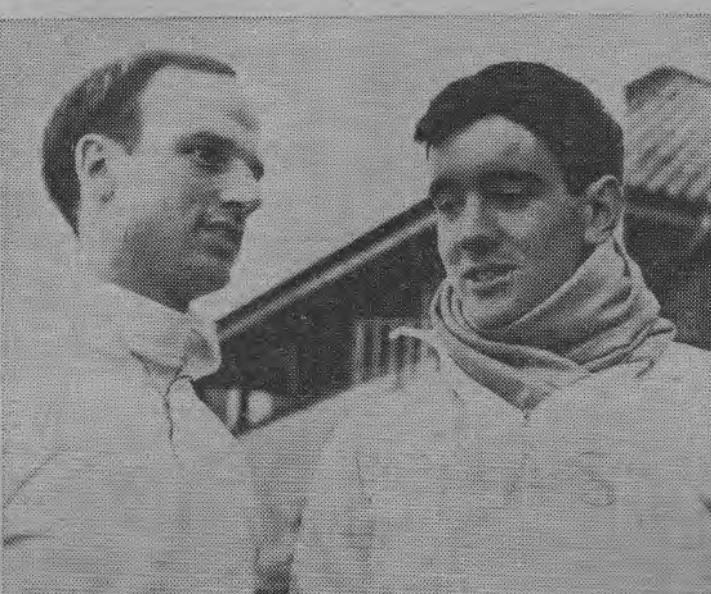

The other freshman in the boat is Peter Conze, an American from Yale. Five newcomers, including another American John Ashby from Eliot House who is at No. 8, are rowing in the Goldie crew.

No changes were made in the order of rowing of the Goldie crew today.

## City boys must be on target

The Cambridge City schoolboys' team manager, Mr. M. J. Knights, will not announce until just before the kick-off his team for tomorrow evening's English Schools F.A. trophy tie against United F.C.'s ground (7.15).

It is highly probable, however, that it will be the same eleven who defeated North Hertfordshire, St. Albans and North Leicestershire on their way into the competition proper and will read: Speak (Grammar); Anderson (Chesterton) Bevan (Manor); Bell (Netherhall), Staden (Manor), Plumb (Netherhall); Cracknell (Netherhall), Austin (Netherhall), Newman (Netherhall), Murray (St. Bede's), Galenski (St. Bede's).

Everything is set for a very good game, with the odds slightly in favour of the visitors, who have had much more experience of actual match-play than the Cambridge boys, but ground advantage can have a big effect on the course of any game, particularly in schoolboys soccer.

The Oxford party will be arriving early and having a meal in city before arriving the ground. Their forwards are lively and clever and the struggle between the Oxford attack and the Cambridge defence could well decide the day.

The Cambridge boys' defence have tightened up considerably

since those defeats at the hands of South Cambridgeshire, but the Oxford boys have scored a lot of goals this season and have conceded few so the Cambridge forwards must not waste their opportunities, as they have so often in the past.
