

Bailham seals United's fate in cup final

Cambridge City 2, Cambridge United 1.
(Attendance 1,260).

In difficult conditions some surprisingly good football was achieved by the two local Southern League clubs, Cambridge City and Cambridge United, at Milton Road last night when the home side won last year's held over final of the East Anglian Cup, writes Peter Fearn.

When they were a goal down with seconds left to the interval, it looked as though the writing was on the wall for City as they missed chance after chance. The U's, too, were not without blame in this respect, but while they seemed content with their goal lead they did not count on two goals from Eddie Bailham, City centre-forward, in the last half hour.

Playing in their crimson track-suit tops, City were soon into the attack and Bailham was the first forward to get in a shot, but Rodney Slack held it comfortably. This was the cue for United's inside-right Amato to head just wide of the City goal a minute later.

So the pattern was set on the ice that kept away the majority of fans from both camps. It was end to end play in the first 45 minutes with the players doing their best, but there was little real excitement to keep the small crowd warm.

United were at their most dangerous when they turned defence into attack. They cleared City's efforts and swept back to

the Milton Road end goal like hornets but, like City, their balance was upset when it came to finishing.

The pace was fast as the ball skidded off the snow and there were mistakes; but the United could not knock City off their game and one always felt that if the home side could have scored the issue would have been completed long before the final six minutes.

Cool

Eventually it was United who took the lead with a well taken goal in the dying seconds of the first half. Centre-forward John Turley, out on the right, sent over a long cross and City's skipper, Brendan McNally, taking a first time clearance, sliced the ball and left-winger Peter Hobbs ran in to beat Brian Caine to it and head over the keeper's head in cool fashion.

In the second period City had nearly all the game. Billy Wall was switched from the left to right flank and he gave former colleague Roy Poole a hard 45 minutes as he engineered the ball into the middle time and again. Gerry Ward, too, worked hard and Bailham now looked as if he only needed a half chance to be on the scorers' list.

To my mind United made a mistake in playing defensively when in the lead. Certainly they paid the penalty although it took City long enough to break through.

No chance

The equaliser arrived in the 72nd minute when Wall chipped the ball into the middle and Bailham beat the magnificent Slack for the first time when the keeper had no chance against the flashing header.

The winner arrived in soft fashion six minutes from the end. Ward started the move when the curling pass across field found Alan Spears, back temporarily on the right wing. The winger muddled the ball into the centre to the unmarked Bailham, who scored with United's defence appealing for an offside decision which never arrived.

Although United made efforts to come back to level terms, City's defence was giving nothing away and they held out comfortably for the side to lift their second trophy of the season.

Harada may defend title in London

Fighting Harada, the Japanese world bantamweight boxing champion, will probably defend his title in London in May against the winner of the fight on January 31 between Alan Rudkin and the Mexican, Edmund Esparza, the Tokio matchmaker, Richie Inoue, said today.

"I am cabling the British promoter, Harry Levene, today

telling him Harada is interested providing the terms of the contract are acceptable to the champion." Inoue told Reuter.

Levene cabled Harada's manager, Takeshi Sasazaki, four days ago offering the Japanese £21,400 to defend his title in London in May against the winner of the Rudkin-Esparza fight.

Inoue hinted that Harada would hold out for a larger

purse, if he were to accept the challenge.

Inoue told Reuter of the possibility of Harada meeting Rudkin or Esparza, after seeing Sasazaki today.

Sasazaki had earlier turned down the offer, saying Harada had already fought and beaten Rudkin, the British Empire champion, and wanted to give a chance to other contenders.

Late breakthrough by M.C.C.

THE COST OF NO RACING

What had weather and subsequent cancellation cost racecourse executives is one of the lesser known aspects of the industry.

The largest single factor is the fixture fee and advertisement of the meeting in the Racing Calendar, which varies between £320 and £350.

Then, there is the preparation of the course, including fences and hurdles, cleaning, heating and lighting buildings, printing of racecards, newspaper advertising and posters.

The wages of gamemen, ear park officials and police are added to the bill if racing is abandoned on the day.

Brian Richardson, a 33-year-old agricultural scientist, today became the first Tasmanian batsman for 41 years to score a century against the M.C.C. cricket team.

Richardson hit 112, including one six and 15 fours, in helping Tasmania to total 271 for eight wickets in answer to the M.C.C.'s first innings score of 371 for nine declared.

So with one day left for play in the three-day game, Tasmania are 100 runs in arrears.

The match is the first of two tune-up games in Tasmania for the touring team before returning to the mainland for the fourth Test against Australia in Adelaide. But throughout the day there had been little competitive atmosphere about the play.

Only after tea, when Tasmania were 208 for three, did M.C.C. begin to intensify their efforts when the new ball proved too much for the State batsmen.

David Brown began the breakthrough after tea, claiming two wickets for nine runs in four overs with the new ball. Barry Knight then removed the stubborn Richardson, and Ken Higgs followed up by taking two wickets in his first over of the new spell.

Richardson's century was the only grace of a lacklustre day of cricket. His strong pulling and cutting took him to a century in 135 minutes, but at 107 he left the field for a time with cartilage

trouble in his right knee. On his return, he stayed for only six more minutes and five more runs.

Games row brews

The suggestion that Britain's Olympic team should arrive in Mexico City at least one month before the 1968 Games was ridiculous, said Bill Lovett, secretary of the Amateur Boxing Association, today.

This would mean people being away for about two months, he said. "How can we possibly get amateur boxers for that length of time?"

Mr. Lovett was commenting on the report by the medical advisory committee of the British Olympic Association which recommended that as long a period as is administratively and financially possible should be spent by the team before the Games in Mexico City, which is over 7000ft above sea level.

The committee suggested that the minimum period required to achieve reasonable acclimatisation should be approximately one month.

Mr. Lovett added: "They choose a place for the Olympics and then spend years finding out whether it is suitable."

Major David Salow, commenting on the report for the British Horse Society, said the International Equestrian Federation had requested that the equestrian events be held at a lower altitude than Mexico City.

All square at half-time

Equality of the sexes

Equality of the sexes has received another boost now that female undergraduates are to be allowed to join the Cambridge University Tennis Club. The coach, Mr. H. L. Smith, said today that this was quite an innovation because women have been barred since the club was founded 85 years ago.

The decision to open the courts to girls was taken at a special general meeting last term.

"I think it is a very good thing and that the club will be enhanced because of this decision," said Mr. Smith. "It will be much more like a tennis club. It will have social advantages and I think it will make a difference to our gates."

He said that most of the University women's team had joined. "Now that girls are full members of the University, I think they should have the same facilities as the men," Mr. Smith added.

Targogan Lincoln top weight

Targogan, the Irish-trained winner of last year's Cambridgehire and beaten only half a length in last season's Lincoln Handicap, has been allotted top-weight of 9st 7lb in this year's big Doncaster handicap, the weights for which were published today.

This is 6lb more than Targogan carried last March and four pounds more than when he gained a neck victory over Karelia in the Cambridgehire in the Autumn.

Karelia (7st 8lb) is now 4lb worse off with Targogan compared with the Cambridgehire, but 13lb better off than in last year's Lincoln, when she finished fifth, a head, short head and three parts of a length behind the Irish horse.

Printer (third), Aberdeen (fourth) and Vijay (seventh) are all in with lighter weights this time, but Be Hopeful, who was

sixth last year and has been "whispered" for this year's race, has gone up a pound from 8st 3lb to 8st 4lb.

Convamore, runner-up to Meadow Court in last season's Irish Sweepstake Derby, is weighted up to his best form with 9 stone and so is Minor Portion (8st 10lb).

On Saturday there will be an event for boys under 16 for the Drake Digby Memorial Shield. Adrian Bloom, the senior champion, won the memorial shield 10 years ago at Bury Fen.

For the British championship, skaters from clubs in London, Nottingham and Birmingham will be taking part.
