Another late flourish

Chelmsford City 1, Cambridge United 2. (Attendance 2,012).

The present upward surge for Cambridge United continued last night when they gained a very creditable win at Chelmsford in an Eastern Professional Floodlight League fixture, writes David Hallett.

It was a victory justly deserved by a team who held an edge over their opponents for most of the 90 minutes. Chelmsford's only moments of superiority were in the first minutes of the second half but then the United defence presented a solid barrier.

It was the late burst that is quickly becoming typical of the team which gave United their victory. After dictating the trend, it looked as though the visitors would have to be content with a goalless draw.

A couple of chances were missed by the United forwards before Bennett's corner was helped into the net by Docherty in the 72nd minute. Chelmsford quickly equalised through Butcher after Poole had headed an effort by Houghton off the line.

Pressure

For the last 10 minutes United really put on the pressure and they should have been awarded a goal when a 25-yard left-foot shot from Hobbs beat King and hit the underside of the bar. The ball bounced over the line before Costello cleared but the linesman was not up with play so United were denied a goal.

With four minutes to go Wesley Maughan scored the winning goal against his old team. Jackie Scarr hit a 40-yard pass between the full-back and centre-half and Maughan raced clear. He rolled the ball wide of the goalkeeper from the edge of the area and for several long seconds the United players held their breath before the ball hit the inside of the post and gently rolled into the back of the net.

David Barrett had one of his best games for the club as he worked tirelessly both supplying his colleagues with chances and trying shots at goal. Hobbs, as always, never stopped running and Maughan and Bennett moved well on the wings.

Solid

The defence was a solid, compact unit and Jackie Scarr made a welcome return after a mystery injury. He had a quiet return and played his trump card with the late pass for the winning goal.

With this victory United, who have lost only one game in the competition this season, joined the Eastern Professional League leaders. They have the same points as Cambridge City and Chelmsford from the same number of games.

If United can beat City at Newmarket Road on Monday they could well go one better than last season when they finished runners-up.

Depleted Light Blues hold on

Cambridge University R.U.F.C. gave a creditable performance to gain a draw against Trinity College, Dublin, at Grange Road yesterday after being badly hit by injuries during the match.

Varsity had a full team for only the first six minutes, yet they managed a draw with a penalty goal and a try to two dropped goals.

Billy Raybould left the field after six minutes with a cut face and Robert Barker went off after 10 minutes with a knee injury. Both returned just before half-time, only to watch Phillip Kitchin helped off with a bad leg injury. Kitchin did not return but, after an X-ray at hospital, he was told there was no break.

The Light Blues' only chance of victory seemed to be with the threequarters and it appeared that if they could get the ball out and throw it around they might overcome the fiery Irishmen.

Defence in depth. But only twice was the ball sent down the line and from one of the movements Joe Berman crossed powerfully after Mick Doyle had made a break from a set scrum.

The Cambridge pack was out-fought by the Irishmen but they were, of course, depleted through injury.

After the first few minutes, Trinity College pressed furiously and the ball was not out of the Cambridge 25 for nearly 20 minutes. In defence, however, Cambridge were magnificent. They covered in depth and the pack fought and tackled ferociously.

Cambridge equalised in the 47th minute when Doyle broke from a set piece midway in the Trinity College half. He made ground before sending to Peebles. The ball went to Berman and the strong running winger powered his way through to touch down 10 yards in from touch. Gethin failed to kick the goal.

Ten minutes later the visitors won a scrum eight yards from the Cambridge line. The ball came back quickly to Murphy, who dropped a good goal to give his side the lead again.
